2025 SNAPSHOT

2025 was a year of growth for ECVN. Here are some of our biggest accomplishments!

Developing our first organizational strategic plan to guide our mission and ensure long-term sustainability.

Completing the first statewide landscape analysis of community violence intervention, helping to map needs, assets, and opportunities for strategic investment.

Amplifying the voices of those directly impacted by violence, ensuring that lived experience remains at the heart of Delaware's CVI movement through media, and programming.

Collaborating closely with survivors, public health officials, law enforcement, and local, state, and federal leaders, advancing coordination and understanding across sectors.

Hosting Delaware's first-ever Community Violence Intervention Summit, in partnership with Delaware State University, bringing together survivors, service providers, advocates, policymakers, researchers, funders, and national experts.

Engaging the business community in new and strategic ways, building bridges between public safety, economic opportunity, and community well-being.

Earning regional and national recognition, garnering media coverage and elevating Delaware as a model and thought leader in the CVI space.

Bringing national thought leaders and partners to Delaware, fostering shared learning and strengthening our collective vision.

Launching an innovative Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) pilot in Laurel, where, as of this publication, the community has celebrated **zero homicides**—a testament to what is possible when public health, public safety, community, and philanthropy strategically align.


CVI IMPACT & INNOVATION

GRANT PROGRAM LAUNCH

ECVN provided robust technical assistance to ecosystem partners and applicants. Through a pre-application Research & Evaluation Training and 1:1 meetings, we helped applicants brainstorm ideas and develop their applications.

Ultimately, we distributed \$200,000 in grant funds to four organizations. These grantees also received ongoing training and support, including a Community Advocacy Training and Governance 101.

CELEBRATING WINS: ZERO HOMICIDES IN LAUREL

Small towns and rural areas often experience high crime rates, yet these areas are overlooked in statewide violence prevention conversations and efforts.

Laurel had a disproportionately high crime rate until a group of residents took charge after three teenagers were fatally shot in a 6-month period in 2023. Laurel residents launched Operation West Laurel (OWL), which has partnered with ECVN to reduce gun violence.

Their efforts have paid off: all violent crime was down in Laurel from 2024 to 2025, including homicides, shootings, and shots fired.

"The absence of shootings or homicides in Laurel this year shows what's possible when the community comes together. Faith leaders, social service providers, law enforcement officials, and partners like Operation West Laurel are helping create the conditions for safety, while the Gun Violence Intervention (GVI) model ensures those most at risk receive support and accountability. These results are encouraging, but the rise in assaults reminds us we can't be complacent – we must expand prevention programs, strengthen public awareness, and invest in solutions that stop violence before it starts."

SHAPING THE NARRATIVE

Throughout 2025, ECVN hosted and participated in local and national events to build alignment across organizations working to prevent gun violence and to shape community conversations. This includes several tactics—such as our op-ed and public-private breakfast—designed to educate and engage the business community as strong partners in this work.

JANUARY

Launched ECVN in Sussex County to elevate visibility and catalyze investment in communities below the canal, advancing efforts to interrupt and prevent cycles of violence

MARCH

Hosted a webinar on Gun Violence Prevention Advocacy, Legislation, & Community-Driven Solutions

APRIL

Engaged local and national partners to support professionalization and standardization of ecosystem through a meet-and-greet event

Hosted a hybrid convening in Wilmington, Delaware with Brady: United Against Gun Violence, Everytown for Gun Safety, Giffords, and the Johns Hopkins Center for Gun Violence Solutions to enable national partners to learn from Wilmington-based CVI organizations and share opportunities for collaboration and national best practices in policy and research.

MAY

Participated in Governor Meyer's executive order signing establishing the Office of Gun Violence Prevention and Community Safety

Co-hosted the Annual Gun Violence Prevention Advocacy Day in Dover, convening community leaders, advocates, and policymakers to advance statewide violence prevention priorities

JUNE

Engaged Cities United for the first ever statewide CVI landscape analysis

Lauren co-authored an op-ed in the Delaware Business Times: "A Shared Responsibility – How Business Can Help Strengthen Community Safety in Delaware"


Launched the Wilmington CVI Coalition to coordinate efforts amongst service providers, CVI organizations, state and local elected and appointed officials, and the philanthropic community, in partnership with Wilmington's Community Public Safety Initiative (CPSI)

JULY

Partnered with Gun Violence Intervention (GVI) and the Department of Justice for the Dover Voices Heard Town Hall Series to amplify local voices and solutions to violence

AUGUST

Launched Sussex County Peace and Prosperity Project alongside Operation West Laurel



The Sussex County Peace and Prosperity Project is designed to build community pride and security by creating safe, cared for, public spaces. ECVN obtained community input and feedback through surveys and focus groups as we launched. So far we've hosted two community clean-ups, supported the Laurel Police Department's Laurel Night Out, and provided three trainings to build capacity for local nonprofits. Next, we'll build community gardens that provide fresh fruits, vegetables, and flowers and honor young lives lost to gun violence in Laurel

SEPTEMBER

Hosted a Wilmington Public-Private Breakfast featuring the Commercial Club of Chicago, highlighting cross-sector alignment strategies to reduce gun violence and strengthen workforce and economic development

OCTOBER

Partnered with Delaware State University to host the inaugural CVI Summit, highlighting statewide progress and exploring opportunities to leverage regional and national best practices, as well as the latest research and data

DECEMBER

Launched the Dover CVI Coalition, with plans to launch the Sussex CVI Coalition in January 2026

LOOKING AHEAD

2025 was a year of building alignment and laying the foundation for ECVN's sustainability as an organization and for the movement as a whole. In 2026, we are excited to build upon this foundation and operationalize plans made in 2025.

In 2025, we provided technical assistance to the Governor's Office and the newly formed Office of Gun Violence Prevention and Community Safety, the Wilmington Mayor's Office & City Council, and the Laurel Mayor's Office and Police Chief.

Looking ahead, we will continue to provide technical assistance to other public, private, and government entities. This includes providing ongoing support to our CVI Impact & Innovation Grantees.

We recognize that there are numerous social determinants that drive gun violence. In light of this, ECVN donated resources for 6,000 meals to the food bank of Delaware in 2025, supported outreach efforts for the unhoused and food insecure in Dover, and supported the Seaford Community of Hope Pantry. Looking ahead to 2026, we will translate our engagement with the business sector into strategic partnerships, including a focus on workforce development. ECVN will also convene healthcare systems to facilitate sector learning, building on the momentum of Christiana and Nemours.

Finally, we are eager to continue formalizing and professionalizing Delaware's CVI community. We are working with public health and law-enforcement officials to make existing data as real-time and convenient as possible, contributing to an accessible data infrastructure that enables us to track the efficacy of our local and state-wide efforts. We are also creating a professional development curriculum for the CVI workforce to build their expertise and capacity.

Whether you were a volunteer, donor, advocate, or ally, we are so grateful to bring you on this journey with us, and we cannot wait to see what 2026 holds.
